Mayor's Report



The Governor asked all Mayors to attend a summit last week on the Avian Flu. We were asked to inform our citizens about the possibility of the Pandemic affecting our communities. The flu virus is expected to reach the U.S. in 8-10 weeks. The fatality rate of those who become sick is extremely high so we want everyone to be informed and to be prepared. GOOD NEWS!

Judge Anthony B. Quinn granted Bluffdale City's motion to stay the operation and enforcement of any Decree of Disconnection while the City appeals Judge Quinn's earlier disconnection decision to the Utah Supreme Court. Judge Quinn recognized that the legal status quo should be protected while the Utah Supreme Court prepares to hear our case. This means Bluffdale City is still Bluffdale City. It's our right to zone, develop and help our Bluffdale Citizens make their land what they may want it to become. We are encouraging the land owners in the disconnect area to sit down and talk with us about how and what they may want to do with their land. Spring has sprung, the grass is on its way, the flowers will bloom by June and Town Days will bring us together again. It is a joy working on the projects in our city. The park is started. Many volunteers have come to the rescue and we are on. If you have an idea you would like to share, please let us know. We are planning the summer events in the park. We hope to have a fun family event each week with music, arts and fun.

The city is repeatedly receiving numerous complaints that the Zoning Ordinance for permitted "Home Occupations" is being violated. Chapter 12.16 of the ordinance states that Contractors are an accepted "Home Occupation" class "---provided there is no outside storage of equipment and no more than one company vehicle stored on site" (Chapter 12.16.2 #12) Some appear to believe that their residential lot is an equipment storage yard. This is a violation of the ordinance, but also it is not very neighborly. The City appreciates the fine contractors that call Bluffdale home, but just like any other citizen, we expect them to follow the rules. Other businesses have been reported as well. Violation of the ordinance will result in revocation of the business license and is subject to prosecution by the City Attorney to the full extent of the law. It is required that citizens obtain a City Business License for home-occupied businesses. This can be done at the city offices located at the Fire Station (14350 South 2200 West). We have a wonderful and accommodating staff that will be glad to assist you with this process. If you have any questions about whether or not your business is a permitted "Home Occupation," please contact our City Planner, Glen Goins at 254-2200 and he will be happy to address your questions.

House News from Representative Hogue

The 2006 General Session of the Utah State Legislature has come to an end, "Sine Die"; but the Governor will be calling us into a special session sometime in May to deal with additional tax issues. This was a historical legislative session because of a \$1.2 billion surplus. This surplus was not due to tax increases, but was a result of a robust and healthy economy. Almost one half of the surplus came from personal income taxes which by our constitution is to go to public and higher education. A strong debate between

the Senate and House of Representatives brought about many compromises, but in the end, the question of personal tax cuts was not resolved. We did reduce \$20 million in tax cuts for business and another \$70 million in taxes on food; however, when we return in May, we will still address an additional \$70 million in tax cuts on personal income. Some want a flatter tax, others want lower brackets, and still others want more money in public education. In the end, we will have a balanced budget and the State Legislature will still be debating how we address our other needs. Most agree more money should be spent in the classroom educating our children, but we are still slipping behind in comparison to other states. Over 300 laws were passed this session, many that directly impact our communities and families. Not all dealt with money, but they definitely will impact our lives. In future editorials, I will continue to share these changes.

Mountain View Corridor Toll Road Meetings Postponed

The public discussion meetings previously scheduled for March 16th were postponed. The subject is using tolling as an alternative for the Mountain View Corridor (MVC) in west Salt Lake and northwest Utah counties. Council Report

On March 14th, the Council held their regular meeting. The Planning and Zoning Commission was reorganized and the following people now constitute the Commission: MJ Jackson, Stan Mitchell, Dave Lucero, Von Brockbank and J. Lee Bertoch with Jody Tuft serving as alternate. After a public forum, the Council voted to allocate \$2,250.00 to the Road Home program. This money comes from Community Development Block Grant Funding that is allocated from the Salt Lake County Urban County Program. The Road Home is the largest homeless shelter in the State. Last year they served 12 individuals from Bluffdale.

There was much discussion regarding the design and development of the City Park. Suggestions from the Youth Council were considered; possibilities for financing, grants and volunteer efforts were also discussed. Ways to reduce the overall costs were offered by Mark Hansen, a local landscaping expert. Methods of watering the grass and gardens were considered. A motion passed to take money budgeted for the Jordan River Parkway this year that was not spent, plus any monies donated or in-kind contributions to help the park so that work can begin immediately.

Exciting things for Bluffdale are in the works. The City has executed and dedicated a conservation easement on the property known as Overlook Park at Spring View Farms. The Overlook Park will be preserved and protected as open space for the benefit of all the citizens of Bluffdale. The Spring View Farms developers are hopeful the park improvements will be completed by mid-summer. The park will contain a lake which will be a water source for secondary water. There will be restrooms, a pavilion a tot lot, and the pedestrian trail will connect with the trail system within Spring View Farms. Let's take the opportunity to walk the trails and enjoy the park.

The planning is underway for an equestrian trail head at the north end of the City at approximately

3800 South and 1300 West. We will keep you informed. Updated information on the trail system through Parry Farms on the south side of 14600 South is coming soon!

March 13, 2006 The following letter was sent to Bluffdale City from the Utah Lake Distributing Co., of Orem, Utah. Any question contact the Utah Lake Distributing Company of Orem, Utah: (801)225-6746.

To Whom It May Concern:

The Canal Company easement, which includes the canal and the maintenance roads adjacent to it, is private property. The Company does not allow this property to be used without permission for any purpose other than the delivery of water to its shareholders and the maintenance of the canal. Anyone who uses this easement for recreational purposes such as walking, jogging, bike riding, ATV riding, horse back riding, joy riding or any other recreational purpose is trespassing. This policy must be enforced so that the water master can effectively maintain and police the

canal and for safety and liability reasons.

Please inform your staff members and citizenry of this policy. Also please inform any developers in your city that they must not tell potential lot buyers that the canal road may be used for recreational purposes either verbally or on a plot plan.

After teaching fifth grade at Bluffdale Elementary for eight years, the position of Literacy Facilitator became available in 2004 when the Board of Education decided to fund it. I hold a Reading Endorsement, a Master's Degree with a reading emphasis, and have a strong interest in literacy, so this position readily appealed to me. Although I have been given many literacy-centered duties in this new role, my main responsibility is providing Professional Development for teachers, helping them become "reading specialists" in their classrooms. My charge is to model "research-based" reading and writing strategies and to observe teachers as they instruct their students using the same techniques.

I have made myself aware of each student's level of reading achievement, and I offer assistance to teachers in providing and planning interventions for students deemed to be "at risk". A Literacy Facilitator has many varied responsibilities. Last year, for much of the day I worked directly with groups of students teaching comprehension strategies. This year I've been asked to go into classrooms to assist teachers in strategy instruction. Since this is a new position, it's been somewhat of a challenge trying to define it. I appreciate the patience of a supportive staff and caring community as I undertake this important responsibility. Because I want to make reading and writing enjoyable for every child, I encourage each citizen to support literacy at home as well as at school. Together, we

Have you ever wondered how "Bluffdale" became the name of our fair city? Few people realize that Bluffdale has had at least four names since it was settled in the 1860's. It was first named "Oliver," after the first railroad section Forman working on the railroad that passed through town (although it wasn't much of a town back then.) A few years later, it was renamed "Mosley" after the first LDS Bishop of the area. As many of you know, the name Mousley, is still a prominent name in Bluffdale. The name was then changed to "Bluff," but it was found that another town in Southeastern Utah had the same name, and the United States Post Office would not allow two Bluffs in the same state. Consequently, the name was changed once more. It was finally decided that the name should be "Bluffdale" because of it's landscape. A bluff is a small hill, while a dale is another name for a valley. Thus the name Bluffdale! The Bluffdale Historic Preservation Coun-

cil seeks to foster an appreciation of Bluffdale's past by identifying historic areas, landmarks, and buildings. Our first monthly meeting was held on March 23rd. An organization was established with Mark Anderson elected as it's chairman, while Vernon Dunn was elected vice-chairman. Gloria Neilson was elected secretary and treasurer. Top Five Most Common Reasons Horses are Complained About

Having horses in your yard is an enjoyment for many. Understanding how your horse might upset the neighbor and making adjustments on your end can prevent complaints and avoid hard feelings. Here are a few things to be aware of from the perspective of the neighbor.

5 Leaning on the Neighbors Fence: Horses quite frequently like to lean on or over the fence causing it to warp, bend or break. This is especially common this time of year when the new coming grass appears to be greener on the other side.

Please realize, even if your property is secured by a fence, it could be your neighbors fence and not yours. If so, put up your own fence, or put up an electric device to keep your horse off of the neighbor's fence.

4 Horse is leaning on the fence with the rear end, rubbing side to side: There are several reasons horses do this. One is that they could need their sheath cleaned. It is also common around the time when horses shed off their winter hair. One way to remedy this is to find old barn and garage brooms which are no longer in use or broken. Take the bristle end off and nail it to secure posts in the horses corral (not on the neighbor's fence). That way he will rub his tail and rear end on the bristles and leave the fence alone. This also helps with the grooming.

3 Horse paws at the fence, or in the stall creating damage or making lots of noise: There are different reasons why horses paw. Mostly it is because they are looking for food. When they do it can be noisy. They can also get their shoe caught in the wire of the fence and get stuck. This is particularly common with field fence. Field fence is never a good fence for securing horses. Consider V-mesh type of fence as opposed to field fence. If your animal is in a stall and paws at the door, making noise and disturbing neighbors then consider a pawing chain, at least at night. Another solution, feed your horse at the same time each day so they don't get overly hungry.

#2 Horse shelters and barns being built inside of the required set back: Ordinance 12.6.5.7 clearly states: Accessory buildings that house animals or poultry shall have a minimum rear setback of fifty feet and be located no less than seventy-five feet from any dwelling unit. Please be aware of this when you are considering shelter for your horse.

#1 Build up of horse manure on your premises creating a strong

odor and flies: This is a very serious issue that can result in Health Department intervention. It is extremely important to make sure horse dung is cleared away at least once a week. Fly traps help keep the fly population down as well.
